Whole Class 60-90 Minutes

Purpose:

The purpose of this activity is to introduce students to the work and accomplishments of acclaimed author Kerry Greenwood prior to visiting the *Her Place* exhibition. Students will investigate some biographical details about the author and then respond creatively to her infamous 'lady detective', the Honourable Miss Phryne Fisher.

Activities: 1. Getting to know Kerry Greenwood

2. A new chapter for Miss Phryne Fisher

Activity 1

Getting to know Kerry Greenwood

Provide students with the following questions, which they should answer by undertaking some independent research:

- 1. Who is Kerry Greenwood?
- 2. Where was Kerry born and what degrees does she hold?
- 3. How many books has she written (fiction and non-fiction)?
- 4. What awards has Kerry won and what quality does each award recognise?
- 5. What previous careers or jobs did Kerry Greenwood hold prior to becoming an author? What job does she still hold as well as being an author?
- 6. Who is Greenwood's most famous fictional character? Why did she choose the 1920s as the era for her exploits?
- 7. Why did Kerry Greenwood create a character who is an upper-class woman?

Activity 2

Creative response

In this activity, students have the option to respond to Kerry Greenwood's character Miss Phryne Fisher by either designing a book cover for a new title about Miss Fisher or completing a short creative writing piece.

- 2. Ask students to nominate an activity from the two options available. Either:
- a) Create **a short story** about the fabulous Miss Phryne Fisher and her latest 1920s 'lady detective' case. Students may make up the 'facts of the case' themselves, but must keep the above descriptions of Phryne in mind, because they will help them to accurately portray her character.

Items and circumstances to be included in the story:

- A pearl-handled pistol.
- A fur coat.
- A silver letter opener.
- A steam train.
- A fancy luncheon.
- The grand 1920s house of a liberated and independent woman.
 A photograph of a child.
- A barking dog.
- A rainy night.
- b) Create **a book cover** for a new Phryne Fisher novel. Students should make up a title for the book and keep the above descriptions of Phryne in mind, because they will help them to accurately portray her character. Viewing some previous covers of Kerry Greenwood's Phryne Fisher series of novels may help to inspire your students. These can easily be found online.
