### 3. Biography: Rosa Parks *Civil Rights Activist*

In America when Rosa Parks was alive, white people and African-Americans were treated very differently. In certain states of the country, the treatment of African-Americans was extremely bad. There were different schools, toilets, drinking fountains, churches and so on. African-Americans even had to sit at the back of the bus and were not allowed to sit if a white person wanted a seat.

Parks made history on 1 December 1955 when she refused to give up her seat to a white man on the bus. The police arrived, arrested and fined her \$10 for breaking a segregation law. Rosa refused to pay the fine as she said the law was illegal. She even appealed to a higher court.

In protest, a large number of African-Americans decided that they would no longer use the city buses. Dr Martin Luther King Jr was one of the people who encouraged African-Americans to boycott the buses. Even though this meant that many people had to walk to school and work, as many of them did not own cars, they still refused to pay for the bus and for 381 days they held together in a stand against segregated laws.

Eventually, the U.S. Supreme Court decided that Rosa was correct and that the segregation laws that forced African-Americans to stand for white people were unconstitutional.
