Gweneth Wisewould - Biography

- Born 1884, died 1972
- General Practitioner
- Graduated from the University of Melbourne (M.B., B.S., 1915)
- She was a resident at the Melbourne (1915-16) and Alfred (1916) hospitals, and senior resident (1917) at the Queen's Memorial Infectious Diseases Hospital
- In 1938, Wisewould moved to Trentham, 95km northwest of Melbourne
- She worked as the town's doctor until the day of her death at the age of 87
- Often, she did not charge for her services if patients couldn't afford to pay
- She published her book, *Outpost*, an account of her life and work in the country, in 1971
- Despite Trentham being a conservative town at the time, Wisewould regularly wore men's clothing
- She donated \$20,000 to the University of Melbourne to provide 'Truganini Scholarships' for Aboriginal students in 1968
